

# KENYA EXPORT PERFORMANCE IN JULYSEPTEMBER 2023-2024

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
#### 1 KENYA'S TRADE PERFORMANCE IN JUL-SEPT (2023 & 2024)

Kenya's trade performance in the period (July-September) of 2024 presented mixed outcomes compared to the same period in 2023. According to data from KRA (KNBS), both exports and imports showed varying trends during the period from July to September 2024.

The country saw a marginal growth in its total exports, while imports experienced wider marginal growth, leading to a widening trade deficit (See Figure 1). This report offers a detailed comparative analysis of Kenya's trade for the reviewed period of 2024 versus that of 2023, highlighting key trends in export destinations, major export commodities, and trade balances with specific countries.

#### 2 Comparative Perspectives of Kenya's Trade in Jul-Sept (2023/2024)

In Jul-Sept 2024, total exports were valued at Kshs 278.9 billion compared to Kshs 266.6 billion in same period in 2023; and therefore, total exports increased by Kshs 12.3 billion; (+Change 4.6%).

On the other hand, total imports were valued at Kshs 674.9 billion in the period Jul-Sept 2024, which increased by Kshs 27.8 billion (an increase of 4.3%) from Kshs 647.1 billion in the same period in 2023.

The balance of trade deficit for merchandised trade for the period Jul-Sept 2024 widened by Kshs 15.5 billion (4.1%) to record Kshs 395.9 billion in 2024 from Kshs 380.5 billion in 2023 same period.




Decline in export of Tea was attributed to the decline of exports of tea to Pakistan (Ksh. -3.5 billion), Egypt (Ksh. -2.6 billion) and Sudan (Ksh. -1.2 billion) respectively. Decline in exports for lime, plastering materials and cement was majorly attributed to the decline in export of the merchandise to Rwanda (Ksh.



-1.09 billion) for the reviewed period Jul to Sept 2024 compared to same period in 2023.



**Kenya's trade with other partners** recorded a trade deficit of **Ksh 395.9 billion** in 2024, compared to a deficit of **Ksh 380.5 billion** in 2023, leading to a widened trade deficit by **Ksh 15.49 billion** during the reviewed period.

For the period **July to September 2023 and 2024**, Kenya saw significant shifts in its trade balances with several countries:

- United Arab Emirates (UAE): The trade balance improved by Ksh 44.87 billion, reducing the deficit from Ksh 106.3 billion in 2023 to Ksh 61.4 billion in 2024.
- China: The trade deficit worsened by Ksh 50.56 billion, increasing from Ksh 114.8 billion in 2023 to Ksh 165.3 billion in 2024.
- United States of America (USA): The trade balance improved slightly, with the deficit reducing from Ksh 15.7 billion in 2023 to Ksh 9.0 billion in 2024, marking an improvement of Ksh 6.66 billion.





- Saudi Arabia: The trade deficit improved significantly by Ksh 24.66 billion, reducing from Ksh 30.3 billion in 2023 to Ksh 5.7 billion in 2024.
- India: The trade deficit worsened slightly by Ksh 4.06 billion, increasing from Ksh 52.4 billion in 2023 to Ksh 56.5 billion in 2024.
- **Germany:** The trade deficit worsened by **Ksh 3.52 billion**, increasing from **Ksh 4.9 billion** in 2023 to **Ksh 8.4 billion** in 2024.
- **Netherlands:** The trade deficit reduced by **Ksh 7.57 billion**, narrowing from **Ksh 13.2 billion** in 2023 to **Ksh 5.6 billion** in 2024.
- Tanzania: The trade deficit reduced by Ksh 3.59 billion, narrowing from Ksh 5.9 billion in 2023 to Ksh 2.3 billion in 2024.
- **Zambia:** Kenya turned its trade deficit of **Ksh 0.7 billion** in 2023 into a surplus of **Ksh 0.5 billion** in 2024, improving by **Ksh 1.22 billion**.
- Overall Trade Deficit: The total trade deficit for Kenya increased by Ksh 15.49 billion, worsening from Ksh 380.5 billion in 2023 to Ksh 395.9 billion in 2024.

#### 6 Deduction From the Quarter Performance Jul-Sept 2024.

Kenya's trade performance for the period July-September 2024 exhibited mixed outcomes compared to the same period in 2023. Total exports grew marginally by Ksh 12.3 billion (4.6%), increasing from Ksh 266.6 billion in 2023 to Ksh 278.9 billion in 2024. On the other hand, total imports rose by Ksh 27.8 billion (4.3%), reaching Ksh 674.9 billion from Ksh 647.1 billion in the same period. This growth in imports relative to exports resulted in a widened trade deficit, which increased by Ksh 15.49 billion (4.1%) to Ksh 395.9 billion in 2024, up from Ksh 380.5 billion in 2023.

Kenya's export destination markets revealed significant growth in key markets such as the **United Arab Emirates** (+Ksh 10.5 billion), **United States of America** (+Ksh 6.9 billion), **India** (+Ksh 4.9 billion), **Italy** (+Ksh 1.9 billion), and **Belgium** (+Ksh 1.5 billion). However, exports to traditional markets like the **Netherlands** (-Ksh 5.1 billion), **Pakistan** (-Ksh 3.1 billion), **Egypt** (-Ksh 2.8 billion), **South Sudan** (-Ksh 2.2 billion), and **Tanzania** (-Ksh 2.0 billion) recorded significant declines. This highlights both the diversification of Kenya's export markets and ongoing challenges in maintaining performance in long-standing trading relationships.

On the export commodity front, **mineral fuels and oils** emerged as the top-performing product, growing by **Ksh 18.91 billion** (+370.7%). Other notable



performers included **textiles and apparel**, **coffee**, and **animal/vegetable fats and oils**, all of which recorded growth rates exceeding 100%. Conversely, traditional exports such as **tea** (-Ksh 6.08 billion, -35.2%), **iron and steel**, and **meat products** posted significant declines, signalling vulnerabilities in Kenya's key export sectors. This suggests a structural shift, with emerging products such as energy, textiles, and machinery increasingly contributing to Kenya's export performance.

In terms of trade balances with specific countries, improvements were noted with the **United Arab Emirates** (deficit reduced by **Ksh 44.87 billion**) and **Saudi Arabia** (deficit reduced by **Ksh 24.66 billion**). Kenya also shifted from a trade deficit to a surplus with **Zambia**, improving by **Ksh 1.22 billion**. Additionally, the trade balance with the **United States** and **Tanzania** saw moderate improvements. However, the deficit with **China** worsened significantly, increasing by **Ksh 50.56 billion**, while deficits with **India** and **Germany** also expanded, underlining Kenya's continued import dependency on these markets.

Kenya's trade performance for the reviewed period shows a **marginal improvement in exports** but a **faster rise in imports**, leading to a widened trade deficit. While diversification into new markets and emerging export products shows promise, the decline in traditional export commodities and high import dependency—particularly on China and India—remain challenges.

Moving forward, efforts to enhance **export competitiveness**, promote **value addition** in key products like tea, and reduce reliance on imports will be critical in addressing the trade imbalance and achieving sustainable trade growth.

Total imports to Kenya grew by 4.3%, rising from Ksh 647.1 billion in 2023 to Ksh 674.9 billion in 2024. However, imports from African countries saw a mixed performance, with some key trading partners, such as Tanzania, recording modest growth of 11.8%, while others, like Uganda, declined by 11.9%.
